EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Anti-illegal immigration mobilisation remains active across multiple provinces as South Africa enters the final 48 hours before the planned demonstrations on 30 June.

Overnight activity remained largely localised and characterised by sporadic road blockages, planned marches and community gatherings. Government has reiterated that 30 June will be a normal business day and that a significant national law enforcement deployment is in place to maintain public order.

Organisers continue to describe the action as peaceful protest rather than a national shutdown.

The risk of localised disruption, intimidation of foreign-owned businesses and opportunistic criminality remains elevated.



1. WHAT HAS HAPPENED (PREVIOUS 12 HOURS)



Isolated protest activity reported overnight in parts of Gauteng townships with police monitoring in place.



Visible police and POP deployments continue in CBDs, transport hubs and around foreign-owned business nodes.



Tyre burning and temporary road blockages recorded on the R66 in eMthonjaneni (KZN) and on the N12 near Delmas (MP).



Planned marches confirmed for Eloff, Delmas (MP), Newcastle (KZN) and Verulam (KZN) for Monday, 30 June.



No significant deterioration in the national security posture overnight.

3. INTELLIGENCE ASSESSMENT



Intelligence indicates continued mobilisation momentum ahead of 30 June, supported by multiple independent community groups and civil structures.



Organisers maintain messaging that the demonstrations are lawful protest; however the risk of localised violence, intimidation and property damage remains elevated.



Road blockages, protest routes and foreign-owned businesses remain the highest risk exposure areas.



Law enforcement readiness is high with national coordination structures activated and rapid response capability in place.



4. EXECUTIVE CLIENT ACTIONS



Finalise operational readiness and communication protocols.



Verify alternative routes and access to all critical sites.



Increase situational awareness and supervisory oversight during peak risk periods.



Confirm escalation procedures and contact points with security and emergency services.



Maintain continuous monitoring and updates throughout the weekend.



EXECUTIVE OUTLOOK

The operational outlook for the weekend remains consistent with previous assessments. As 30 June approaches, the likelihood of multiple localised incidents increases, particularly in Gauteng and KwaZulu-Natal. Disruption is expected to remain localised but may affect transport routes, staff movement and access to commercial premises. Organisations should maintain heightened operational readiness and ensure business continuity measures are implemented where appropriate.

8. EXECUTIVE OUTLOOK (NEXT 48 HOURS)

Available intelligence continues to indicate that protest activity will remain decentralised across multiple provinces. The highest probability of disruption is associated with known march routes, CBD environments and key transport corridors.

Widespread national unrest remains unlikely; however, organisations operating within identified areas should expect increased law enforcement visibility, temporary road closures, traffic congestion and short-notice operational disruptions.

Situational awareness and operational preparedness must be maintained throughout Sunday and Monday.

9. RECOMMENDED CLIENT ACTIONS

- Confirm Monday staffing, supervisory coverage and shift arrangements.
- Review alternative transport routes and access to all sites.
- Increase management visibility and supervisory oversight.
- Test escalation procedures and communication protocols.
- Verify emergency contact lists and key stakeholder details.
- Maintain communication with BPC Operations Centre.
- Monitor the BPC Unrest Group for intelligence updates as received.



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
